

### **WHO WE ARE**

Book Clubs for Inmates (BCFI) is a registered charity which organizes volunteer-led book clubs within federal penitentiaries across Canada. Currently, BCFI is facilitating 30 book clubs from Nova Scotia to British Columbia.

BCFI runs French and English language book clubs for men and women incarcerated in minimum, medium, and maximum security facilities. Book clubs are usually made up of 10 -18 members who meet once a month to discuss books, both fiction and non-fiction, of literary merit.

Every month, hundreds of inmates participate in book clubs across the country and each year thousands of brand new books are purchased, read, and discussed.

Transforming lives one book at a time.





Book Clubs for Inmates encourages positive change through the power of literature.

We encourage inmates to make meaningful changes; develop pro-social skills; such as respectful listening and speaking. As inmates read and discuss literature, they also develop stronger reading and communication skills.

Together, these help inmates make meaningful life changes, and upon release, reintegrate more successfully back into the community.

# FROM THE FOUNDER CAROL FINLAY

# This past year has been one of transitions, as BCFI has "come of age". We are now ten years old and there is much to celebrate.

We constantly hear from Correctional Service Canada how valuable the book clubs are in terms of teaching pro-social skills and offering inmates the choice of literature instead of just TV and cards for their spare time. Of course, those who are most impacted are the inmates themselves, who write from prison and halfway houses about the difference the book club is/was to their lives inside, how it was a humanizing activity in a bleak place, and how grateful they are for the wisdom and kindness of the volunteers.

Our board has acquired new faces: John McKeller, CM, QC, who has spent his career involved in the arts, and incorporated BCFI as a charity in its early days; Paul Haslip who designed this annual review and created our brand and website.

As we go to print, I'm delighted to announce that The Hon. Ian Binnie, CC, QC, a former justice of the Supreme Court of Canada and a long time supporter of BCFI has agreed to be our new Honorary Chair; as well, our board now includes Sharon McFadzean, a facilitator of a thriving book club at Bath Institution; David Baker, an eminent disabilities lawyer and one time reader for our book lists; Peter Bennett, our new treasurer has had a long career in finance, specializing in Estate planning and planned giving. And last but not least Helga Stephenson, OOnt, a film industry executive and human rights advocate.

They individually bring much talent and enthusiasm to the board, and are already contributing to the smooth running of BCFI.

We're delighted too that, Margaret Atwood, CC, OOnt, FRSC, FRSL, has agreed to be an Honorary Patron. Her novels are dearly loved by BCFI's book clubs members. As well, she has been an outspoken advocate of the prison farms, and has written about prison conditions for women in her 1996 novel, *Alias Grace*, and about performing Shakespeare in prison in her 2016 novel, *Hag-Seed*, currently being adapted for performance by Prison Performing Arts in St. Louis, Missouri.

2017's fundraising efforts from October to January exceeded our expectations. Donors' generosity has allowed us to open more book clubs, take on two more scholarship recipients, and still keep ahead of our bills. Our heartfelt gratitude goes out to all our generous donors!

I'm pleased to say that at this 10-year anniversary mark (as of August 2018) the future looks very bright. We are in fine fettle, as the saying goes, and we can truly celebrate with you who are such an integral part of all we do for 'the last, the least, and the lost'.







This is a small sample of the books which we have been reading over the past 10 years. We are very grateful to our volunteer readers who assist in the formation of our yearly reading list.
















































# CHIRP Children of Inmates Reading Program



# BUILDING A HEALTHIER PARENT/CHILD RELATIONSHIP

BCFI's commitment to the successful reintegration of inmates and to stronger, healthier communities includes the development of Children of Inmates Reading Program (CHIRP). Canadian Families in Corrections Network estimates that there are over 450,000 Canadian children with an incarcerated father and another 1,650 with an incarcerated mother in our federal correctional system.


Under the leadership of a child reading specialist, the mandate of CHIRP is to build and enhance a healthier parent/child relationship, develop literacy and listening skills, increase vocabulary and attention spans for children and promote a love of learning in children through the consistent presence of a parent and books. All are foundational for children in building a successful life emotionally and offering opportunities for success and community stability as they move into adulthood.

### **HOW CHIRP WORKS**

This innovative program connects incarcerated parents and grandparents or other close family members to their children in a very positive and meaningful way. The program has been known as CHIRP or Children of Inmates Reading Program but also is known as Parent Child Reading Program.


It is a simple program to run, with just two enthusiastic volunteers who commit to once a month visits with the parents. They bring along with them a selection of quality children's books. Each participant who has been cleared for the program will choose a book and read that book to their child while they are being recorded with a digital voice recorder. The reading is then transferred later by the volunteer onto a CD and then a pocket is glued into the front of the book and the book and CD are mailed to the child. The program takes place once a month on a set day and time throughout the entire year.














# Circles of Support

Book Clubs for Inmates has supported 9 individuals in accessing post-secondary education through the Justice Joan Lax Memorial Scholarship.

The scholarship was established in 2014 through a donation in memory of Justice Joan Lax, a former member of the BCFI Board of Directors. In addition to the scholarship money, a circle of support is established with each recipient as they navigate their return to the community after incarceration and enter into their educational studies.

### SUPPORT MEMBER

My friendship with a book club member after his release has been entirely positive. Over the past few years I have seen a young man whose youth was spent behind bars integrate successfully into his new life and achieve the lofty goals he had set for himself. For me watching the transformation has been a moving and miraculous experience.

### SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT PAROLEE

For three years, I have been a scholarship recipient from the Joan Lax Memorial Fund. I would never have been able to move ahead in my education without this help, for which I am hugely grateful.

Also making the transition to the community after spending the better part of my adult life in prison has been difficult and challenging. Book Clubs For Inmates (BCFI) has buffered me from these challenges by offering a continuum of support from inside the prison to outside where I meet regularly with a circle of support.

Like the BCFI volunteers inside, the individuals I am connected with in the community meet me at eye level and have welcomed me into their lives in a mutual friendship. I know that I can count on them to be there for me if I ever need to talk and they remind me that my place is in the community, not the prison.
